Lecture 9: files and streams

## Files

open(filename, mode) returns a file object

- filename is a path to a file
- mode is a string where
  - 'r' open for reading (default)
  - $\bullet~'w'$  open for writing, truncating the file first
  - 'x' open for exclusive creation, failing if the file already exists
  - 'a' open for writing, appending to the end of the file if it exists

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- 'b' binary mode
- "t' text mode (default)
- '+' open a disk file for updating (reading and writing)
- file objects are *iterable* and support methods to *read*, *write*, and *flush* data as well as *close* the file

## import sys 2

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```
fin = open(sys.argv[1],'r')
for line in fin:
```

```
print(line,end='')
```

```
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   fin.close()
```

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```
1 import sys
2 from itertools import count
3
4 with open(sys.argv[1],'r') as fin:
5 for line, lineno in zip(fin,count(1)):
6 if (lineno % 2 == 1):
7 print(line,end='')
```

## interleaving files

Write a program called merge.py that takes two files as input and outputs to the terminal the contents of those files interleaved. For example, suppose file1 and file2 have the following contents:

file1:	file2:
1	2
3	4
5	6
7	8

Now consider running interleave.py on those files

```
$ python3 interleave.py file1 file2
1
2
3
4
5
6
7
8
```

## import sys

```
with open(sys.argv[1],'r') as fin1, open(sys.argv[2],'r') as fin2:
    for line1,line2 in zip(fin1,fin2):
        print(line1,end='')
        print(line2,end='')
```

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
